### SPECIAL GIFT TO ST. ANN'S GIRLS HOME

eaders of this newsletter may know of John O'Connor, who has been visiting RGuyana for the past five years to teach a semester of courses at the St. Joseph Mercy Hospital School of Nursing. While there, he writes a weekly letter, "Ramblings", about the country and his experiences.

ast Fall, some of John's letters focused on St. Ann's Girls Home (associated with GCC since the late '60s), and a recipient of the letter was particularly impressed by two needs. First, Camp Kayuka, which is nearby, urgently needed fixing up so that it could be safely used by the St. Ann's girls for outings and holidays. Basic renovations would cost close to Canadian \$4,000.

The second "need" wasn't even recognized until Maria, one of the St. Ann's 📕 girls, kept mentioning to John that her birthday was coming up ...... and MAYBE she could have a present? Maria was persistent enough (like the person who kept on asking in one of Jesus' stories!) that John eventually arranged a little outing for her to the shops where she might be able to find THE FIRST NEW CLOTHES SHE'D EVER HAD. This outing was a spectacular success.



Here is a photo taken just afterwards, and you can see Maria's delight in her new top and pants, though you can't see quite how much fun the outing itself was.

he reader of the "Ramblings" shortly afterwards inherited some money from her late mother, and decided to contribute enough for the basic rehabilitation of Camp Kayuka (\$4,000) and to make it possible for each of the St. Ann's girls to have a similar birthday outing for at least the next five years (\$6,000). Thanks to Maria, who believed "Ask and it shall be given to you"! A total of Canadian \$10,000 was given to GCC for St. Ann's.

hanks to John, who responded, and to Sister Beatrice Fernandes at the Home, ■ who encouraged him, and to the shop assistants who helped Maria choose! As for the donor, she says that her mother would have liked to know some of her bequest was used this way, and that the donation itself has been a source of joy to the giver. Good results all around!

We would like to bring your attention to the upcoming Guyana Independence celebrations in Canada, held under the auspices of the Honorable Consulate General of Guyana, Mr. Danny Doobay, in commemoration of Guyana's 41<sup>st</sup> Independence Anniversary. This celebration is an important part of Guyanese heritage and there will be numerous activities held between May 27 and June 22 to make this a special occasion.

Our dedicated members and volunteers continue to undertake various projects. Some activities over the fall and winter included:

Food Fair & Bake Sale: This is our biggest fundraiser and I am most happy to report that our October 2006 event was the most successful, -- thanks to all contributors, helpers and those who come out in large numbers in support of this very popular annual event. This year's function will be held on Sunday, October 28, 2007.

Hospital Beds: GCC and the Palms Restoration Committee joined forces and shipped 53 hospital beds to the Palms Institution in Georgetown. These beds were given to us by Chelsea Nursing Home. Shortly after, a further 715 beds became available and was offered to us by several nursing homes. Unfortunately, we could not afford the freight cost needed to ship these additional beds to Guyana.

Knowing full well how desperately these beds are needed, and the benefit and comfort, they would bring to the sick and elderly, we contacted Guyana's Council General, who accepted the offer and had the beds shipped to Guyana. A job well done! Our thanks and appreciation go out to our very trusted and long time supporter, Joachin Reigber, who was instrumental in making the initial contact for the donation of beds. I would like to thank all those who have made our mission a reality, -- our members, volunteers, supporters and donors, who gave so willingly and freely of their time, efforts, material aid and storage. 

C ince the cost of freight to ship these beds to Guyana far Dexceeded GCC's budget, contact was made with the Guyana Consulate General, who undertook to bear these costs. The Consul General after contacting the Ministers of Health and Social Services in Guyana, indicated that the beds can be used immediately at New Amsterdam, Skeldon, Port Mourant, Mibikuri, Suddie, Charity, Lethem, Mabaruma and other social services institutions.

The cost to ship these beds in twelve 40 ft. containers is ▲ \$55,000 (Cdn.). CC has always been shipping beds to Guyana, when Davailable. The latest was 53 beds and 28 mattresses shipped to the Palms Institution in Georgetown, -- thanks to the generosity of the Palms Restoration Committee (Toronto Chapter) who paid the greater part of the cost of freight for these items. This presented a great opportunity to utilize the remaining funds raised by The Palms Fundraising Committee, which were generated some years ago -- needless to say they were received with deep and sincere appreciation.

REMEMBERING KEN DAVIS.....whose dedicated life came to a close on Monday, Feb. 5 this year after a lengthy illness. His active life was dedicated to assisting less fortunate countries of the world and their inhabitants through the Canadian Foundation for World Development organization, which he established.

ne of our lucky days was being asked to participate in one of his shipments scheduled for Guyana. A significant project at that time was his "eye care" program, which provided ophthalmologic examinations and eye glasses to the underprivileged in Guyana and other areas of the Caribbean. We were asked to provide some help with a shipment and thereafter we were given a wide range of assistance for the charitable work we were engaged in. This included immense help with our storage problems by allocating for our usage, a large area in the unoccupied industrial buildings made available to him in areas awaiting redevelopment. Ken made several trips to Guyana to meet personally with the charitable organizations there, in order to get a first-hand understanding of their needs.

Ten and his wife, Ruth, are shining examples of lives dedicated to helping the less fortunate and we acknowledge with gratitude their many kindnesses. To Ruth their daughters, grandchildren and all other members of their family we offer our sincere condolences in the loss of their loved one.

#### **U**PDATE

By the end of October 2006, GCC had shipped two 40-ft. containers, which expended our 2006/07 budget. However, there were 40 boxes that could not be accommodated with the last 40 ft. container. These boxes were co-shipped with another shipper. In addition to this co-shipment, another 40 ft. container (with 53 beds and 28 mattresses) was sent to the Palms Institution.

Bad weather halted packing of items for shipment. From March 22, 2007 our volunteers resumed to sort donations and pack boxes for the next shipment.

Our storage facilities, including our members' garages are packed with donations. A large quantity of drapes, privacy curtains and linens were also donated by St. Peter's Hospital. These were transported to the 10 Budworth location and packed for shipment.

# Guyana's History -You thought you knew

### Q: Who first scaled Mount Roraima?

A: Everard Im Thurn and Harry Perkins, in 1884. Their expedition to try to climb Roraima was sponsored by the Royal Geographical society, the Royal Society and the British Association. Detailed accounts of their successful climb were prepared for Proceedings of the Royal Geographical Society. See Journey to the Lost World.

O: The first Europeans to settle in Guyana were the Dutch. What crop did they first cultivate?

A: Cotton.

Q: Where did Europeans first settle in Guyana?

A: Old Fort Nassau on the Berbice River. Abraham van Pere, a Dutchman, sailed up the river in September 1627 with forty men and twenty youths and settled there with the intention of trading with the Amerindians. Trade was done in salt, tobacco, wood and arnatto (annatto), a dye mainly for fabrics.
