The Mercy Boys' Home in Guyana (founded in 2000 by the Sisters of Mercy) is a safe place for boys after they attain the age of 16 at St. John Bosco Boys Orphanage. Many of these boys have been abandoned at birth and have no one and nowhere to go. Boys of that age are still vulnerable, and require a degree of care and guidance.

The boys at Mercy Boys' Home are given a start in life, either with assured jobs or continuing education until they reach the age of 21. The outgoing boys are assisted with some financing for their independent life which is a plus, thus giving them the opportunity to enrich their lives.



Bright Horizon Family Home in Soesdyke -- a home for homeless children. Currently, there are some older girls in this residence who have been there since they were 3 or 4 years old -- some of them have no biological parents that they know of...they have no place to go! The home wants to start a Day Care Centre and possibly a Hair Salon where the four (4) girls in the picture (Betsy, Maria, Naomi and Onessa) can be self-employed.



In early 2007, the floors of the School of Nursing classrooms were raised about six inches in order to prevent flooding of the classrooms. This kept the classrooms and the feet of students and faculty dry while they were in the classrooms, but the path outside the classrooms was not raised, so students, faculty and all the employees entering the administrative building or going between classes got wet! The Hospital Board decided that it would be a fitting tribute to the walking style of Sister Sheila's leadership, as well as the values of her faith, to keep others safely above the rising tides and dry. So as part of her celebrations, the "street" was commissioned and poured in record time and a plaque hung. It reads in part, "This walkway is dedicated to the unwavering and yeoman-like service given to St. Joseph Mercy hospital by its CEO Sr. Sheila Walsh, RSM 2000-2008".

A TRIBUTE TO GERRY GOUVEIA

GCC is saddened at the passing of Gerry Gouveia. Gerry was an extremely active member of our organization for very many years. He has been a director from 1995 to 1999 during which time he had a short break. He returned to the board of directors in 2007. In addition to his directors' duties, Gerry was one of our most reliable and ardent "weekly hands on" volunteers with our packing crew. He was doing this up to the week before he died. He never ever forgot where he came from and involved his family in the work of the GCC, especially at our bake sale and at our dances. Gerry, his wife Norma and their family moved out of the Toronto area and we were concerned that his move may have caused him to reduce his involvement. However he tirelessly commuted to our meetings, packing sessions and fund raising events and continued to give his all. He was a wonderful example to us all and a mentor to many.

Gerry was also Past President of the Rotary Club, with other involvements such as the Knights of Columbus, St. Vincent de Paul and Relay for Life Walk (as a family) for the Canadian Cancer Society.

My earliest memories of Gerry were when we were both students at St. Stanislaus College in Georgetown. He was always good for a new "Confucius say" joke, of which he seemed to have an inexhaustible supply. When I left Guyana in early 1955 I lost touch with Gerry, but I knew he had met, fallen in love with, and married Norma. We met again in Georgetown in February 1962 and learnt that he had immigrated to Canada with his family in October 1961. He was as usual, cheerful and full of jokes (not "Confucius say" ones anymore). In the mid 1960's by coincidence we lived on the same street as Gerry and Norma for one year or so, and our friendship with them was renewed. From the early days of the "bake sale" Gerry, Norma and their children were heavily involved with the pastry stall, in baking patties and pine tarts and in organizing the stall on the day. Gerry could always be seen smiling and making change, staying calm in the confusion around him.

In the early 1990's Gerry fell ill with a particularly aggressive cancer. He bore his misfortune with great dignity, optimism, and cheerfulness, and was never heard to complain or express negative comments on his illness. When I last saw Gerry at the New Year's Eve dance he was still smiling and cheerful. He passed away suddenly on Friday March 27th after a very brief illness. He will be greatly missed by all who knew him.

Gerry lived his life most honestly and humbly. He will be remembered for his integrity, his smile, his laugh and his passion for his family, for life and for travel. He loved his family and created a wonderful life here for them.

Our sincere sympathy goes to his wife Norma, his five children and eleven grandchildren.

A TRIBUTE TO DAVID DUMONT

David Dumont was born in Georgetown, Guyana on January 15, 1932. The younger of two children, he never knew his father who died when he was very young. He attended Sacred Heart School, then Queens College.

He was involved with many charities including: the Saint Vincent DePaul society, Stella Maris Fundraising committee, Mercy Hospital Board and the Rotary Club of Georgetown.

His career spanned a broad spectrum ranging from a disc jockey for Radio Demerara to Regional Manager of IBM Guyana, and later years joined RBC Dominion Securities here in Canada.

David was a teenager when converted to the Roman Catholic Religion and for the rest of his life, was a dedicated and involved member of the Church. On immigrating to Canada, he again became involved with the church, as a choir member at Prince of Peace in Scarborough and as a member of the Knights of Columbus. Later he moved to Pickering and became a Minister of Hospitality at St. Isaac Jogues Catholic Church.

David became a member of Guyana Christian Charities (Canada) Inc. He was always willing to help in any area of activity, especially at the dances and bake sale and insisted in donating his favourite -- cassava pone. No effort was too great for a good cause.

Despite all these activities, Dave's family always came first – he was devoted to his family. He was never too busy to take the children and their friends to the drive-in, to the creeks for picnics, or to play a game of cricket

In the past few months, David had begun to slow down but he never complained, just carried on as usual. In his final days, he insisted on working at the church throughout the Holy Week and for the last GCC fundraiser on April 18. On Good Friday, he was one of the last to leave the altar and was thanked by Fr. John - that surely served as his last blessing as, on April 25, 2009, God took him gently home.

To his wife Yvonne, children and grandchildren, on behalf of all his friends at GCC, we offer our deepest sympathy.

A DEDICATED VOLUNTEER

For many years she assisted in roti making for the Bake Sale and worked in the kitchen on the day of the bake sale. We are grateful to have had her help and devotion for so many years. PACKING AND SHIPPING UPDATE

n our last Newsletter, GCC made

an appeal to our members and supporters for useable and clean items for donation to the less fortunate in Guyana. This appeal was answered in a significant way. Our storage facilities were replenished very quickly and our members and volunteers resumed packing items in boxes ready for shipment to over 100 recipients including orphanages, community organizations, individuals, hospitals, religious and non-governmental agencies. Thanks to all who supported us.

VVe are expecting that our first shipment for 2009, a 40-ft. container will leave Canada early June. Included in this shipment are:

- medical supplies and equipment, clothing, shoes, sewing supplies, bicycles, wheelchairs, school supplies, books, stationery, bed linens and kitchen utensils;
- 1,000 pairs of frames for eye glasses donated by Ms. Raimonda Kelly of Perfect Optical. These optical frames are being sent to the Georgetown Public Hospital, attention: Mr. Michael Khan, the chief Executive Officer, who will ensure that the frames will be given to patients in the Eye Clinic free of charge;
- About 800 pairs of lightly used orthopedic shoes and boots were also donated by The Management of The Orthotic Group and are partly included in this shipment;
- 47 computers (desk tops, laptops and printers) were generously donated by Mr. Tony Dos Santos from Montreal. These much needed items will fill a huge requirement to several organizations to keep abreast of this technology;
- A huge Church Bell donated by Barbara White from Vancouver will be sent to the interior to satisfy the needs of the community there.

GCC is grateful to all who donated items for shipment. Because of your donation we are able to help so many people in our dear land and at the same time assist us to deliver our mandate. We look forward to your continued support.

And this was certainly evident at our recent Spring Dance



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Guyana's History You thought you knew

- Q: What fish found in Guyana is regarded as the largest fresh water fish in the world?
- A: The arapaima. It has been known to attain a length of 15 feet and weight 400 pounds. The fish was once widespread throughout Guyana but now (year 2001) found only in the Rewa, Essequibo and Rupununi rivers in the North Rupununi area of Guyana.
- Q: What crab in Guyana does not live in its own shell?
- A: The Hermit or Soldier Crab. The hinder part of its body is soft and unprotected. So it finds a shell of the snail-like mollusc that is of suitable size and inserts itself in it. When it outgrows that shell, it looks for a larger one and occupies that. There is sometimes great competition among Hermit Crabs for mollusc shells on the beach.
