CELEBRATING 20 YEARS OF SERVICE AS A REGISTERED CHARITY TARGETED TO PEOPLE IN NEED

The year 2007 marks 20 years of service as a Registered Charity. As many of you may ▲ already know, it all started in the late 1960s, when a group of past pupils and parents closely connected to the nuns who operated the St. Ann's Girls Orphanage in Georgetown and the St. John Bosco Boys Orphanage in Plaisance, learned that these two facilities were experiencing great difficulties obtaining funds to maintain their services and buildings. To help cover some part of this deficit, a group of ladies organized and held a "Bring and Buy Sale" (typically Guyanese). The proceeds assisted with Christmas parties for the orphans. This became an annual feature and with increasing support from the Guyanese community in Toronto, attendance rose. This increase ensured the funding of additional special projects.

Collowing a further appeal from the Ursuline Sisters in 1977, Vera Lopes (decd.) and Anne Marie Reigber formed an enlarged group which assumed the name "The Alleluia Committee of Guyana". These committed individuals expanded their efforts to raise and collect money for the maintenance of both the Georgetown and Plaisance Orphanages. Vera remained a dedicated supporter and benefactor till her death a few years ago.

In 1978, the group held what had become its Annual Bake Sale at Holy Spirit Parish Hall on Sheppard Avenue. Remittances to the Orphanages expanded to include items like food, clothing and school supplies.

eanwhile, about 1980, another group of Guyanese, under the leadership of Mannie da Meanwhile, about 1980, allouising group of Gayanese, and a silva (decd.) was also organizing. Mannie had received an urgent appeal from Fr. Harold Wong SJ for funds to replace the aging Organ for the Brickdam Cathedral. This new group was appropriately named The Organ Committee. Their first endeavour was a successful fundraising dance. This successful event became the forerunner of our very entertaining and popular "Valentine" Dance.

ventually, these two groups which were comprised mostly of the same persons decided they would be more effective if they merged. Out of this merger Guyana Christian Charities (Canada) Inc. was created and Desmond De Barros assumed the role of first President. The organization was established as a Registered Charitable Organization in 1987 and complies with the rules of the Canada Revenue Agency.

In 1985, due to the critical shortage of medical and other supplies in Guyana, the first Valentine's Dance was held. The funds raised paid for a much needed shipment of donated medical items that was sent to St. Joseph's Mercy Hospital. This annual event continues to be well received and hence, very successful. Two additional dances have been added, one in May and the other in September. The proceeds from the Spring and Fall Dances are utilized primarily for humanitarian health efforts.

ur Food and Bake Sale event, held annually in late October, has steadily grown in popularity since the early efforts. The locations have changed as the numbers of supporters have increased. From the earliest days at Holy Spirit Parish Hall on Sheppard Avenue, Scarborough, we moved to L'Amoreaux Community Centre in 1994. When this facility became inadequate, we again moved to the much larger and well appointed facilities of Sts. Peter and Paul Ukrainian Church Banquet Hall at Markham and Milner Avenue. ooking back over the many years, and recognizing the need to adjust to the changing times in order to deal with the many challenges and pressures facing us, we have intensified our methods in providing aid and assistance to the underprivileged and the needy through: -- increased support to various organizations, individuals, families and communities; -- enhanced participation to persons seeking urgent medical attention, individually, as well as jointly with other organizations both in Guyana and Canada; -aided victims of natural disasters in Guyana and internationally; -- assisted youths in their endeavours in Guyana, as well as youths who are interested in volunteering their time to work in Guyana; -- and instituted a program for educating children in Guyana. Incorporating these activities, without losing the high caliber teamwork we have achieved, was a major challenge -- thanks to the full participation of our members.

Although tremendous progress has been made, we are under no illusion that what has been accomplished is sufficient. We are also aware that in future years the following will assist us in becoming a stronger organization - internally and externally: 1) technology -- we have created our own website -- http://www.gcccanada.org, which is constantly being renewed and updated, as well we are able to transmit shipping documents to our sub-partner/s in Guyana; and 2) members/volunteers/supporters -- we continuously seek to enroll new and younger members, volunteers and supporters; they are needed to revitalize and maintain our existence, so that we could continue with our mandate. At this time, I would like to extend a warm welcome to our new members, volunteers and supporters.

Our journey thus far has been gratifying through your continued support of our many annual fundraising events, and I would like to express my personal gratitude to all members, supporters, volunteers and donors for their time, effort and generosity, including those who assist and support our many other endeavors.

I thought it would be interesting to our readers to highlight some financial statistics over the twenty-year period of our

registration in Canada, which also show where the funds you helped us to raise have been spent.

Statistics of 20 Years in the life of Guyana Christian Charities (Canada) Inc.

Freight – on shipments to Guyana	272,000
Medical assistance/Care items etc.	172,000
Financial aid & Educational Sponsorship	166,000
Warehousing & other operating expenses	109,000
Donations – Orphanages, the poor etc.	106,000
Total	\$ 825,000

During this period, we shipped fifty containers to Guyana with an estimated value of contents totaling approximately \$2.5 million Canadian dollars. It is to be noted that we did not incur any expenditure in remunerations or auditing, as these services are provided *free of charge*. We are eternally grateful to this group of volunteers and members for their continued assistance, which is truly priceless, as well as the generosity of those who provide free storage for donated items awaiting packing and shipment. We have also strived to ensure that a minimum of 95 cents of each dollar find its way into Guyana in one way or the other, in satisfaction of our goal. I am happy to report that to date we have been successful in attaining and continuing this objective.

Where did the Summer go? We now face the Fall and Winter with great enthusiasm -- As we continue to work together, our intention is to generate even better results than that of the past 20 years, so that we can continue to provide charitable programs in communities from coast to coast in Guyana and wherever needed if feasible.

CO-OPERATIVE EFFORTS ENABLES THE ACQUISITION OF MERCY TRUCK

Readers may remember Rev. John O'Connor, a volunteer who is currently in his 6th stint of teaching and other activities with the St. Joseph Mercy School of Nursing in Georgetown. "Rev. John", as he is known to his students in Psychology, Sociology and Nursing Ethics, reported recently on an impressively successful fundraising effort, which has resulted in a new "Mercy Truck".

The old truck had been on its last legs for years. Sister Sheila (CEO of St. Joseph Mercy Hospital) had tried hard to find some individual or group who would donate one but, as with so many projects, co-operative "I will if you will" efforts turned out to be the most productive.

Sister Sheila had received an offer from Loyola Foundation, a Catholic charity, that they would pay for half a truck. But alas, half a truck doesn't run! So the other half? Here, says Rev. John, is where the co-operation comes in. There was some donated money left over from an earlier project he'd spearheaded, the construction of a new Faculty Flat for visiting short-term teachers. Sister Sheila and Bernard Gonsalves asked if John, who had raised the money for the flat, would be willing to use the leftover funds to be put towards the truck.

John thought this was a good idea and agreed, but there still wasn't enough for a whole truck. He says, "Sister Sheila's prayers were answered doublefold when the Frank J. Lewis foundation sent an unexpected grant towards the project. Two individuals also contributed, but the total was still not quite what was needed This is where my favourite group became vital: Guyana Christian Charities! They agreed to match the leftover Flat donations, and presto: there was the remaining half of the truck! See the photos below for evidence of its reality -- and the fact that it was duly blessed by a priest!"

The truck is much bigger and more reliable than the old one, and is on the road everyday picking up essential products for the running of the hospital. Adds Rev. John, "I know everyone here really appreciates your generosity. I am amazed that with an initial offering of \$5,000, Sister Sheila managed to have that amount transformed into sufficient funds for a 'brandnew reconditioned' vehicle. I think she may have missed a Wall Street career."

Or perhaps it's just that old and always astonishing miracle of turning small things into large, goodwill into real achievements!



PACKING AND SHIPPING UPDATE



Since our May 2007 newsletter, GCC has received a wide variety of donations and has shipped two 40ft. containers to over 80 different organizations across Guyana. The first container arrived in Guyana in July 2007 and the second will arrive on October 30 for distribution in time for the Christmas Holidays.

Thanks to all our donors, volunteers and members for making this operation successful. Included in these shipments were bicycles, hospital bed mattresses, cribs, wheelchairs, clothing and shoes for all ages, toiletries, medical supplies and equipment, kitchen utensils, bed linens, crafts and sewing materials, stationery, school supplies, toys and Christmas decorations.

Agroup who donated 600 pairs of orthotic shoes. Approximately half of these shoes were included in the last shipment.

GCC has expanded an area in which it provides assistance to include Ogle, Industry and Vryhiedlust on the East Coast of Demerara. We have shipped thirteen boxes to the Guyana Presbyterian Church to cater to the needy in these areas.

For these two shipments, GCC used computer technology to send the shipping documentation to Bill Fernandes in Guyana. We are pleased to report that the pilot projects were successful and we will continue to use this technology in future shipments.

Guyana's History – You thought you knew

- Q: The German botanist Robert Schomburgk came upon an impressive plant on the Berbice River in 1836 and sent specimens back to Europe. Name this plant.
- A: The Victoria or Victoria regia or Victoria amazonica the famous giant water-lily. The English botanist and horticulturist John Lindley established the genus Victoria and named the species regia in honor of Queen Victoria. Interestingly, in 1850 the year after botanists were able to get the Victoria to flower in Europe, Queen Victoria, accompanied by the French president (later Napoleon III), went to the Royal Botanic Gardens at Kew to view the flowering.
- Q: How did Brickdam in Georgetown get its name?
- A: Brickdam street was the main and middle and best surfaced street of the infant capital of Georgetown. Paved with bricks (hence its name) and with lamps on each side, it ran from the ferry stelling (then called King's Stelling) going east. Later, it was surfaced with burnt earth and in 1921. It was hastily macadamized for the visit of the Prince of Wales from England.
