The Covid-19 epidemic adversely affected Guyana Christian Charities Inc. (GCC) fund raising and packing and shipping activities in 2020. Our volunteers, the majority being seniors had to be extremely careful not to be exposed to this deadly virus and had to take all the necessary precautions to prevent this illness. However, GCC was still able to pack and ship one (1) 40 ft. container to Guyana.

On September 22nd, the Zim vessel Taipei Trader arrived in Guyana with this container for distribution to over 59 organizations across Guyana. The container had 822 packages with men's, women's, and children's clothing, a lawn mower, hospital beds, books, shoes, toys, food items, wheelchairs, walkers, medical supplies, computers and accessories, toiletries, bicycles and a variety of school supplies. This container will be cleared, sorted and released to all the persons and organizations before the Christmas season and will be able to put a smile to so many.

Thanks to all the donors who continued to be so generous in their efforts to assist so many deserving Guyanese. Many of our volunteers collected the donations, took them home, sorted and packed the boxes at home to avoid the Corona virus.

GCC fund-raising activities, e.g. the Spring and Fall Dances, the popular Food and Bake Sales were cancelled because of the virus epidemic. Notwithstanding this difficulty, GCC was still able to ship this container to help so many across Guyana.

Mercy Resident Care centre was opened in 2016 and now home to thirty-three (33) elderly persons. It is a facility run by the St Joseph's Mercy Hospital which is designed for the elderly who can no longer live alone or care for their own personal needs, such as dressing, bathing, personal care, cooking and housekeeping. The facility also caters to those who have chronic medical needs requiring daily attention by a registered nurse.

Guyana's First Skull Replacement Surgery



Guyana's first skull replacement surgery (replacing 40% of a young woman's skull), a first of its kind to be conducted in Guyana, was successfully performed by prominent Guyanese neurosurgeon, Dr. Amarnauth Dukhi, at the St Joseph Mercy Hospital.

At the age of 10 years, Analisa Latchman of Lima Sands, Essequibo, developed a deformity on her left side face, which grew bigger over the years. Approximately six months ago she began experiencing severe headaches which subsequently led to the loss of consciousness.

In early July 2020, her family took her to see neurosurgeon, Dr Amarnauth Dukhi who made the diagnosis of a rare genetic bone disease—Craniofacial Fibrous Dysplasia—that afflicts one to five persons out of every 15,000 to 30,000 people. This is a craniofacial fibrous dysplasia, a bone disease of the face and skull that replaces normal bone with fibrous-type tissue.

On August 22, Dr. Dukhi performed the delicate operation on twenty-four year old Analisa, bypassing critical nerves in a sixhour surgery amicably assisted by the surgeon Dr. Anna Singh and with the help of a largely female medical team. The skull implant was procured from KLS Martin, a medical equipment supplier company in the United States.

The cost of the skull implant was US\$11,000 and was made possible after numerous donations to her GoFundMe page. The hospital charges are being taken care of by prominent Guyanese businessman, Chris Fernandes and the surgical process was done free of cost by Dr Dukhi.

Dr. Dukhi highlighted that there were no complications during the six hour long intricate surgery and that it was uneventful and successful. **This was a first world surgical procedure that was done in a third world developing country and the first time that someone with this disease was diagnosed and treated in Guyana.** Four days after the procedure, Analisa is already walking and talking and is no longer having headaches. It is expected that Analisa will lead a long and normal life.

Deputy Chief Executive Officer at St. Joseph Mercy Hospital, Mrs. Deborah Ramsay said the institution's administration is pleased with the partnership they have developed with Dr. Dukhi and his clinic, Neurospine Services Inc.

She said the administration looks forward to more surgeries of its kind, including the possibility of Open Awake Surgery for the brain. "We are moving into an area of service coming from Dr. Dukhi in this hospital in a very a 21st century way... I am so happy people don't have to travel anymore to do this type of surgery that would cost them five times the amount that it would cost in Guyana. We are very pleased with the partnership."

The St. Joseph Mercy Hospital proudly presents another essential service to boost the Quality of care delivered in Guyana. Their Ambulance Service is a collaborative effort that includes AOMS (Atlantic Offshore Medical Services) a Canadian Base Company and Eureka Laboratory of Guyana.

Our Motto at all times is to serve all regardless of race, religion, gender or status, we believe that in order to help preserve life we must be able to initiate the process at the very beginning and be able to get our clients promptly to the necessary care needed.

The Ambulance is well equipped with all lifesaving equipment, medications and medical personnel. These include Doctors trained staff nurses, midwife and ambulance drivers who are certified in

- 1. Basic Life Support
- 2. Advance Cardiac Life Support
- 3. Emergency First Aid Support

As calls come into our Institution through the Emergency Room telephone #226-1592, 223-5447, 620-8378 and #624-8378, emergency personnel are briefed and dispatched to location of clients in need of assistance and like clockwork the ambulance is swiftly off on its way.

The staff on arrival at the scene with Personal Protective Equipment on and after making sure the scene is safe a quick assessment history and vital signs check are done and immediately information is related to the emergency room doctors as to status of client.

Administering of necessary emergency care such as oxygen therapy, stabilization of Fractures, Immobilization of Spinal Injuries compression of bleeding sites, reassuring and gaining the clients confidence are all part of our holistic care given at all times.

Transport to the Medical Institution is done in a quick and safe Manner and at all times our medical staff is keep updated of the clients' status. On arrival at the emergency room there is a smooth transfer of patients to the waiting triage nurse and attending physician.

Our services also include transport of clients' post-surgical procedures and visits to other Institution for added medical care. May God bless us all as we continue to do his will and keep us safe.

Tarah Persaud, from the Essequibo Coast in Guyana was visiting her daughter Ramratty Boodoosingh in Etobicoke, Toronto, Canada.

On Wednesday March 4th, 2020, Tarah felt dizzy, collapsed and fell in her daughter's residence. She was rushed to the Etobicoke General Hospital and was diagnosed with intracerebral hemorrhage (bleeding in the brain) due to a stroke. "This case has happened many times before and has caused undue financial hardships. It is important that visitors travelling to relatives in Canada should consider buying adequate Medical Insurance Coverage (especially if they have a pre-existing medical condition) before travelling. Insurance can be obtained at the time of purchasing your Travel ticket, which can be done in Canada or the country of origin"

Ramratty agreed to let the doctors perform urgent surgery to save her Mom. The bill from the hospital is for \$46,000+ Cdn. Ramratty and her Mom do not have the resources to meet this huge amount. She contacted the Guyana Christian Charities Inc. (GCC) to seek assistance. GCC loaned her a Hospital Bed and a wheelchair while she recuperated at her daughter's residence. In addition, GCC contributed \$2,000, and the GCC-Bernard Memorial Fund another \$1,000 towards the hospital bill. Other donations have also been received from supportive Guyanese community.

Ramratty is facing insolvency for the balance of this Invoice. She is seeking assistance from fellow Guyanese and friends to save her from disaster. GCC has offered to issue Tax Receipts for donations towards this cause for amounts of \$20. and above, and will make payments directly to the Etobicoke General Hospital. 


